Group News

CHURCH VISITING – JACKIE SEARL

For the third successive month, the group has enjoyed a "different" type of visit – a Chapel of Ease, rather than a parish church, at Thistleton. The village was mentioned in the Doomsday Book but "digs" have found evidence of Iron Age and Roman settlement including a renowned Roman temple as well as being on the Viking Way. Today the village has only 47 houses but no village hall, shop or pub and lacks public transport.

The earliest apparent part of the church is the 14th century bell tower with a single bell. Significant restoration or rebuilding took place in the mid/late 19th century but records show a rector in post in 1225 so there must have been an earlier church on the site. There is no war memorial as the village men were exempt war service as the parish was an agricultural one providing food. Later it was discovered that four men born in the parish had served after moving elsewhere. Plans are in place to install a memorial to the three Walker brothers who were killed and another man who had moved to Canada and returned with Canadian forces.

The church has a simple layout with nave and chancel only. The carved pulpit is striking as are the moveable oak pews. The chancel apse however is very unusual with its terracotta reredos showing the burial of Jesus. This was carved by Mario Ragi, from Carrera, Italy in 1850, who later became a member of the Royal Academy. On the walls of the apse are four terracotta models of Mathew, Mark, Luke and John. The fiancée of D H Lawrence is buried in the churchyard.



In 2017 it was decided that the former Thistleton parish church was no longer viable and its future was uncertain. There was simply no one able and/or willing to serve and congregations had dwindled. By merging the Thistleton parish with nearby Cottesmore, the church was designated a Chapel of East able to hold services when it was felt to be appropriate or for the key festivals in the year. However, the chapel receives no support from the PCC and has to be entirely self-funding. To this end the *Friends of Thistleton Church* was formed to fundraise for repairs and to provide a central point in a village with no other facilities. In three years £47,000 has been raised, with the occupants of around 80% of the village properties helping in some way. Another £35,000 is needed for roof, replacement of the non-working Victorian heating and other repairs.

Coffee mornings are held on Saturdays with everyone welcome. The group can thoroughly recommend the cakes! Also enjoyed was a visit to the nearby Herb Nursery with its ranges of herbs, unusual plants and vegetables.

Visit to The Aircraft Restoration Company Duxford

On the 27th June the Aviation History Group visited the Aircraft Restoration Company at Duxford Airfield. This company rarely give access to groups to visit their service and repair hangar or their restoration hangar, but we were privileged to be allowed a visit.

After being briefed on what we could take pictures of and what we could not, we were shown around both hangars by a very knowledgeable young man and shown all the aircraft and projects.

Seeing a Spitfire built from a wreck or repaired from a no undercarriage landing was something very special to all of us and something we may never get so close to again.

There were also lots of planes flying and some good food to be had for lunch before leaving to tackle the A14 on the way home. Altogether a day to be remembered.
